#### Resolution #13

WHEREAS, September 3 of this year marked the 20th anniversary of the horrendous fire at the Imperial Food Products plant in Hamlet, North Carolina, that led to the death of 26 workers and injuries to 56 others; and

HONORING THE MEMORY OF THE VICTIMS OF THE IMPERIAL FOOD PRODUCTS FIRE

WHEREAS, on that date 20 years ago an overhead hydraulic line at the plant ruptured, spilling its volatile liquid onto the floor, whose vapors were ignited by gas burners under the fryers, turning the facility into an inferno of flames and thick vellow smoke; and

WHEREAS, panicked employees rushed for the emergency exits attempting to escape, only to find many of the emergency exits locked; and

WHEREAS, bodies were found around the locked emergency exit doors and in the freezer where workers had fled in a futile effort to escape the heat and smoke; and

WHEREAS, the victims of the plant fire were: David Michael Albright, Peggy Jean Anderson, Margaret Teresa Banks, Fred Ernest Barrington, Josephine Barrington, Elizabeth Ann Bellamy, Gail V. Campbell, Rosie Ann Chambers, Josie M. Coulter, John R. Gagnon, Bertha C. Jarrell, Brenda Gail Kelly, Janice Marie Lynch, Michael Morrison, Rosie Marie Peele, Mary Alice Quick, Cynthia Marie Ratcliff, Martha E. Ratcliff, Donald Bruce Rich, Minnie Mae Thompson, Cynthia CS. Wall, Mary Lillian Wall, Jeffrey Antonio Webb, Rose Lynette Wilkins; and

WHEREAS, Philip Ray Dawkins, a delivery worker, also died in the fire, and Patricia Hatcher who received serious injuries in the fire, also died a few years later; and

WHEREAS, the fire caused not only the loss of life and serious injury but also resulted in the closing of the plant and the loss of 200 jobs; and

WHEREAS, the Imperial Food Products plant had never been inspected by state OSHA due in part to the grave shortage of OSHA health and safety inspectors; and

WHEREAS, the fire helped bring to light the mostly invisible body count of workers needlessly killed in the service of their employers; and

WHEREAS, stricter workplace safety laws were enacted after the fire, largely at the urging of the North Carolina State AFL-CIO, that included an appropriation to hire 61 new health and safety inspectors and necessary support staff to bring the OSHA program to benchmark levels and give our state the second largest number of inspectors of any state-run program; new "whistleblower" protection for employees who are retaliated against for filing or being involved in health and safety complaints, including treble damages; legislation requiring all employers with a workers' compensation experience rate modifier of 1.5 or more to establish safety programs to improve workplace safety, and those with 11 or more employees to create safety and health committees made up of an equal number of employer and employee representatives; legislation extending OSHA penalties to state agencies and local governments; an increase in OSHA penalties generally; creation of a special-emphasis program authorizing the state DOL to target for more frequent inspections those employers with a high frequency of OSHA violations or work-related injuries; establishment of a task force to study how the organizational structure of the state fire safety and occupational health and safety functions could be reorganized to be more efficient and responsive; legislation requiring employers to make annual reports on work-related deaths, injuries or illnesses and providing the N.C. DOL with access to certain information from the Industrial Commission, the Rate Bureau, and the Commissioner of Insurance; and legislation requiring the State Building Commission to study ways to make State construction project sites safer for employees and requiring that contractors on such projects designate safety officers for each project; now

1	THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the delegates to the North Carolina State AFL-CIO convention observe a moment of
2	silence upon the passage of this Resolution to honor the memory of the victims of the Imperial Food Product Fire and all
3	those in our state who have gone to work and needlessly never returned to their families and loved ones; and

5	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Carolina State AFL-CIO continue its efforts to speak out for and otherwise strive
6	to help create safe and healthy workplaces.
