# Legislative Report: Mid-Session 2013

Since the deadline for the filing of most bills in the North Carolina General Assembly has just passed, we thought this might be a good opportunity to offer a very brief review of what has happened to date.

## An uphill battle for working families

Over 1700 bills have been filed. We have identified well over 250 that we will be keeping an eye on. As examples, there are over a dozen bills on workers' compensation, almost as many on unemployment, over three dozen bills on election issues, a half dozen aimed just at unions, as well as bills on education, taxes, consumer issues and some bills of importance to those working in specific industries. Most of these bills have not yet been considered; some may never be.

In our legislative agenda prepared before this legislative session began, we indicated that it would be challenging to garner support for our positions given the current make-up of the legislature, and that has certainly been the case to date.

#### Disdain for workers

The legislature showed its disdain for workers immediately in the important area of unemployment benefits. Our state's trust fund, from which benefits are paid, is not solvent, primarily because employers were given substantial reductions in contribution rates when the economy was sound. One of the first bills filed, drafted in large part by the Chamber of Commerce, and without any input from those representing workers or the unemployed, proposed to solve the problem almost entirely on the backs of workers. The bill slashed benefits, cutting the maximum that one can receive, cutting the number of weeks that one can draw, and changing the formula by which benefits are calculated so that many would receive less. The bill also made it more difficult for unemployed workers to be eligible to receive any benefits at all. No state has ever cut benefits so drastically. More, passage of the bill meant that the State rejected \$780 million in federal money for those eligible for federal extended benefits. The tax increase on employers in comparison to the benefit cuts was miniscule. Amendments were proposed both in committee and on the floor to soften the impact of the bill or to delay it so that extended benefits could continue. All amendments were defeated, almost entirely on party lines.

#### **Disdain for unions**

The disdain for unions has been equally clear. In his remarks opening the session, Speaker Tillis indicated that his goal was to keep North Carolina the least organized state in the union. True to his word, on the first day he introduced legislation (HB 6) to put onto the 2014 ballot 3 anti-union constitutional amendments. If passed, these amendments would enshrine in our constitution our current so-called right to work law and the state's current prohibition on collective bargaining agreements for any public employees. In addition, there is an amendment that would require that no union can be certified without a so-called secret ballot election. The Raleigh News & Observer called the legislation, given the current state of the law, "positively ridiculous." It was the just first of a number of anti-union bills, including another on the same subject (HB 53), three on project labor agreements and government contracts (HB 110, H611 and HB 872) and one prohibiting local governments from authorizing employer deductions of union dues (HB 677).

# Many areas of concern

There are many, many other areas of concern. As a few examples, the majority passed legislation denying federal Medicaid benefits for 500,000 needy North Carolinians and allowed the Earned Income Tax Credit to expire. The majority has also proposed legislation undermining public education while endorsing use of public money to support private schools, is pushing legislation to suppress voting by requiring voter photo ids, shortening early voting and eliminating same day registration and is sponsoring legislation to allow payday lending back in our state.

To be sure, bills that would help working families have been introduced by some of our friends in the legislature. These have included bills to allow for paid sick days, increase the minimum wage with inflation, address wage theft, give assistance to displaced workers, offer protections for farm workers, and provide presumptive workers' comp benefits for firefighters. All, unfortunately, face uphill battles.

We have a presence at the General Assembly almost every day and have tried to keep locals informed of particular bills that might affect their members or their industries specifically.
